Discerning Our Role in Prison Issues, Bonnie McKeown and Earl Smith

In some ways the election of Barak Obama marked the nation's "triumph over race," but in the poorer corners of society, a new system has grown up over the past 40 years to prevent people from moving out of the poverty class.

Quietly, with a series of court decisions chipping away at the Bill of Rights, hundreds of thousands of Americans have been channeled from uninspired schools to drug infested streets, into a profit-making prison system. The incarcerated are mostly black men, but sometimes women, Latinos, and poor whites. Prisoners who have served their time, attempting to return to society, have been labeled felons for life, with scarcely more rights than black men in Alabama during the early 20th century Jim Crow era. Today's criminal justice system is not just infected with racial bias, it has become the mechanism for creating an American caste system, as Michelle Alexander documents in her book, *The New Jim Crow*.

How did this happen? How can we address the issue? With our testimony of equality, and our long history as leaders in prison reform, Friends are in a position to be of great help. Just by educating yourself on the issue, you can be part of the solution. (*Repeats Friday and Saturday*)

What believers should do and how they should live out their faith is a topic in The Epistle to the Romans. Actions and how those actions relate to faith is a topic of religious ethics. This workshop will explore what the Epistle to the Romans has to say to Quakers in relation to ethical issues of wickedness, obedience, judgment, and discernment as well as how Quakers "do" ethics in relation to living out their faith. It may be helpful to read through Romans on your own beforehand, since this will be more of a topical exploration and discussion than a verse by verse study. The workshop will have a 50/50 split between presentation of material and discussion.

Recordkeeping for Monthly Meetings, Cathy Garra

Orderly recordkeeping has been a hallmark for the Religious Society of Friends, whether for business minutes, membership, marriage and everything else. How do we take care of these records within our meeting and encourage their safe care for the future? Small meetings cope with rotating cardboard boxes and large meetings cope with accumulations at a meetinghouse. All meetings deal with conflicts between "keepers" and "tossers," as well as rapidly evolving information technology. How can we make sense of all of this and make full use of the resources available to Illinois Yearly Meeting and its monthly meetings?

We will explore these issues and more together, get acquainted with some resources available, share our true life adventure stories, and figure out how to make a start on a plan that works well for your meeting and its future.
